

HARVEY by Mary Chase THE AUTHOR

Mary Chase (born Mary Coyle; 1906-1981) was born the daughter of American-Irish parents in Denver, Colorado. She worked as a journalist at the *Rocky Mountain News* and married her colleague Robert Chase in 1928.

The first production of *Harvey* opened on Broadway in 1944 and reviews were very positive, with Lewis Nichols of the New York Times acknowledging Chase's "warm and gentle humor" (Nov 12, 1944); and Newsweek declaring Harvey "one of the funniest comedies that has been Broadway's luck in a long time" (Nov 13, 1944).

Chase was awarded the Pulitzer Prize in Drama for *Harvey* in 1945, becoming only the fourth woman to ever win the award. She wrote plays, children's novels, and the screenplay for the *Harvey* (1950) film, which featured James Stewart in the role of Elwood P. Dowd.

A NOTE FROM OUR DIRECTOR

Welcome to the show!

I was very pleased to have the opportunity to direct a play with Leeds Arts Centre and I wanted to find a nice comedy that actually 'says something' about the world. After reading *Harvey*, I knew I couldn't resist the characters in this thought-provoking play, or Mary Chase's brilliant, gentle-yet-brutal comedy writing.

I was intrigued to learn how the play came about - Speaking to Eleanor Harris in 1954, Chase explained how the idea for *Harvey* came to her in 1942 when she saw a neighbour, a widow, who had worked for years to send her only son through college. Chase: "The day I looked at her, her boy had been dead about two months, killed in action in the Pacific. I asked myself...could I ever possibly write anything that might make this woman laugh again?"

A NOTE FROM OUR DIRECTOR (continued)

Harvey has such universal appeal that I knew that a British version would be great fun to direct, and I was delighted when the publishers, Josef Weinberger Ltd, granted us permission to set the play in Britain.

I decided to set the play in 1953 - mercifully, progressive reform in the treatment of mental health from the mid 1950s onwards means that some events, procedures, and treatments in the plot would make the play unworkable if it were set in later decades.

All the same, it is no surprise to me that *Harvey* continues to entertain audiences over 70 years on, as I think it still raises questions and deals with themes that are universal, poignant, and relevant today. That said, the cast and I struggled to agree definitively what the message of the play actually is, so I hope that each of you derives your own unique meaning from it. Either way, I think we could all learn *something* from Elwood!

Human nature probably hasn't changed much since Mary Chase finished writing the play in 1944, and I think that we can rely on human nature to ensure that a character like Elwood will always remain an irresistible curiosity!

Thank you for coming to see the show - I hope you enjoy the magical world of Elwood P. Dowd and Harvey. If you are lucky, you may even catch a glimpse of Harvey.

Not all of us are so fortunate - after all, he does not reveal himself to everyone...

Last year, to highlight the memory of Shakespeare as 'The People's Playwright', the RSC gave the opportunity for fourteen amateur theatre groups to provide a Director and cast to play 'The Mechanicals'.

This is probably the most famous amateur theatre group in literature, comprising Bottom, Quince, Flute, Snug, Snout, and Starveling. The rest of the cast will be made up by professional actors cast by the RSC.






