


Leeds Arts Centre presents

Hay Fever by Noël Coward





Considered by many to be one of Noël Coward's best plays – this frothy comedy has much to delight. The action takes place in the home of the Bliss family. Father, David is a romantic novelist, whilst for his ex-starlet wife Judith, all the

world is quite literally her stage. The family is completed by two spoilt teenagers with artistic pretensions – Simon and Sorel.

On a hot June Saturday afternoon – each announces that they have invited a guest for the weekend. The family is furious with each other and determined to cold shoulder all but their own guest. An uncomfortable tea is followed by a ghastly word-game and escalating romantic confusion – it all seems likely to end in tears!

Coward's legendary wit is put to excellent use in this highly entertaining comedy. It is also one of his most demanding plays, the playwright observed:

...it has no plot at all and remarkably little action. Its general effectiveness depends upon expert technique from each and every member of the cast.

First performed by Leeds Arts Centre 1974, *Hay Fever* has remained a great favourite and was produced successfully again in 1988. Joyce King who played Simon's guest Myra in the first production and prompted the second, little imagined that she would one day direct the play!

Whether this is your first "Coward" play, or you've experienced one before, we hope you'll enjoy the show.

A few words of wisdom from the man himself...

Advice on motivation to a demanding young actor

My dear boy, forget about motivation, just say the lines and don't trip over the furniture.

On playwriting

The most important ingredients of a play are life, death, food, sex and money. But not necessarily in that order.

When asked to identify things with style

A candy-striped Jeep, Jane Austen, Cassius Clay, *The Times* before it changed, Danny la Rue, Charleston in South Carolina, "Monsieur" de Givenchy, a zebra (but *not* a zebra crossing), evading boredom, Gertrude Lawrence, the Paris Opera House, white, a seagull, a Brixham trawler, Margot Fonteyn, any Cole Porter song, English pageantry, Marlene's voice... and... Lingfield has a tiny bit.

On his own legend of ultra-sophistication

With the success of *The Vortex* I was unwise enough to be photographed in bed wearing a Chinese dressing gown and an expression of advanced degeneracy. This was accidental and was caused by blinking at the flashlight, but it emblazoned my unquestionable decadence firmly on the minds of all who saw it.

On television

Time has convinced me of one thing. Television is for appearing on, not looking at.

And finally, on wit

Wit is like caviar, it should be served in small, elegant portions and not splashed about like marmalade.
