#### A note from our Director

Sense and Sensibility is one of my favourite novels and is one of those books which I return to at intervals. As soon as I read this adaptation, I fell in love with it. It was only then that I realised the enormity of the task I had set for myself, the cast, and the crew. With 25 fast-moving scenes and even more scenes within scenes, the play takes us on a rollercoaster ride through the plot. The simple set acts as a backdrop for a cauldron of bubbling passions, and the occasional use of different but simultaneous settings means we can peek into two conversations at the same time. The set is representational and fluid, so different areas of the stage represent different settings at different points in time.

I hope that I have not offended too many traditionalists by my choice of modern music — this play is all about the highs and lows of teenage romantic angst (as well as cheating and conniving relatives and nosey neighbours). There are so many modern music tracks which capture these emotions and describe the mood on stage perfectly; I hope you will allow me this indulgence.

The cast and crew have worked tremendously hard on bringing all aspects of the complicated plot to life. I would like to thank them very much for all of their effort, enthusiasm and commitment in what has been an enjoyable, but nevertheless demanding and immersive, rehearsal period. I would also like to thank my nearest and dearest for their amazing support throughout the process — I really could not have done it without them.

#### Setting the play in context

Jane Austen lived from 1775 to 1817. Although Pride and Prejudice was written between 1795 and 1797, Sense and Sensibility was, in 1811, her first published work, having first been written as a short story entitled 'Elinor and Marianne' in about 1797. Austen wrote 6 novels in all, with two of them (Persuasion and Northanger Abbey) being published posthumously.

One biographer (Jane Austen Centre www.janeausten.co.uk), describes her thus:

During her placid life Miss Austen never allowed her literary work to interfere with her domestic duties: sewing much and admirably, keeping house, writing many letters and reading aloud. Though, however, her days were quiet and her area circumscribed, she saw enough of middle-class provincial society to find a basis on which her dramatic and humorous faculties might build, and such was her power of searching observation and her sympathetic imagination that there are not in English fiction more faithful representations of the life she knew than we possess in her novels.

Jane Austen grew up in the parsonage at Stevenage where her father was rector. She never married and rarely left the family home, except on visits to nearby Bath, where the family moved when she was sixteen. It is amazing that, living such a relatively sheltered life, she was able to encapsulate such wit and insight into all of her characters. After her father's death in 1805, she moved to Southampton with her mother and sister, and in 1809 to Chawton, in Hampshire, where she remained until her death at Winchester on 18<sup>th</sup> July, 1817.

The opening of Sense and Sensibility is rooted in the legal practice of entailment - property was generally inherited by the eldest male heir, often leaving female descendants to find alternative accommodation and means of support. Despite their desperate circumstances, Elinor and Marianne aspire to ideals of true love, whilst contending with matchmaking relatives in the guise of Mrs Jennings and scheming competitors in the person of Lucy Steele.

This modern adaptation of Sense and Sensibility by Jessica Swale was premiered at the Watermill Theatre in April 2014.


