DIRECTORS NOTES

I love the theatre. "The smell of the greasepaint..." what a boring old clichébut when I open my old tin of Leichner face powder and take a sniff (I have been known to do it on spotting my make up box just sitting on the bookcase at home) I am transported backstage. I have flashbacks of the many plays and performances I have been involved in and with each one so many memories. The nervous tension, the mishaps, the stories that develop over time and that never fail to disappoint with reinterpretation and minor embellishment, the friendships. All of it comes flooding back.

I gained confidence through the theatre, I have laughed until I hurt in the theatre, the friendships I hold dearest were born in and around the theatre and I fell in love in the theatre.

That old tin of face powder was given to me by George Teale. Not a name that most of you will be familiar with. He was a wonderful character, an actor, a gentleman and a brilliant story-teller –sometimes the same story but always worth listening to. I suppose George could be referred to as 'old school'.

The Dresser, set in 1942 features an actor-manager of that same old school. 'Sir' faces producing plays with a company made up of those not able to be called up to fight in WWII at a time when the theatre was in a state of flux. 'Sir' might be seen as the last of a dying breed whilst the rebellious Mr Oxenby illustrates where theatre was going as the profession came out of the war years.

On a more intimate and emotional level the play features each characters' relationship with 'Sir'. Tears, laughter, comedy, tragedy, pathos, humanity. All life is here. Each character and indeed everyone involved in the theatre, performers, backstage crew, audience, are all involved for their own possibly very personal reasons. 'Sir' bears the responsibility of giving everyone the part of him that they need whilst taking what he needs from them. Selfish maybe, at times even parasitic, or perhaps a symbiotic relationship, each living off each other but if the balance is wrong, something has to give.

I have thoroughly enjoyed introducing the period of the play through music and sounds of the time so listen out for Al Bowley, Billy Cotton, Anne Shelton, Spike Jones and his City Slickers and Arthur Askey.

We all hope you enjoy the show.

SYNOPSIS

Inspired by the memories of his years working as Donald Wolfit's dresser, Ronald Harwood's evocative, perceptive, funny and beautifully crafted portrait of backstage life is one of the most acclaimed dramas of modern theatre.
