

THE PLAY

"Way of the World" is the way of life of a select society, where witty conversation, malicious gossip and quick repartee were common to everyone in that group.

The plot is a complex interweaving of relationships, friendships and family, and manipulation of law and marriage settlements.

The romantic interest centres on a prodigal Mirabell proving his worth to marry Lady Wishfort's niece, Millamant, a young lady with firm ideas of what she required married life to be. Those who oppose him or finally help him do so with wit and elegance, where anything may happen in a comedy of manners.

THE AUTHOR

William Congreve was born in Bardsey, near Leeds, in 1670, but spent his youth in Ireland. In 1686 he went to Trinity College, Dublin, as a classical scholar. The revolution of 1688 drove him back to England.

In 1691 he entered the Middle Temple to read law. From 1962 onwards, Congreve wrote four plays, the last of which, "The Way of the World", was coolly received at its first performance. He resolved to write no further plays.

Modern audiences find the play more to their taste, possibly because of its complexity of plot, interesting characterization and mastery of dialogue.

In accordance with the requirements of the Licensing Sub-Committee of Leeds City Council:

- a) The public may leave at the end of each performance by all exit and entrance doors and such doors must at that time be open.
- b) All gangways, passages and staircases must be kept entirely free from chairs or any other obstructions.
- c) Persons shall not be permitted to stand or sit in any of the intersecting gangways or stand in any unseated space in the auditorium unless standing space has been specially allowed by the Licensing Committee. A notice is exhibited in that part of the auditorium in which standing has been sanctioned.
- d) The safety curtain must be lowered and raised once immediately before each performance to check that it is in proper working order.
